The Holy Gospel

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark 11.1-11 GLORY TO YOU, LORD JESUS CHRIST

11 ¹When they were approaching Jerusalem, at Bethphage and Bethany, near the Mount of Olives, he sent two of his disciples ² and said to them, 'Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately as you enter it, you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden; untie it and bring it. ³If anyone says to you, "Why are you doing this?" just say this, "The Lord needs it and will send it back here immediately." ' ⁴They went away and found a colt tied near a door, outside in the street. As they were untying it, 5 some of the bystanders said to them, 'What are you doing, untying the colt?' ⁶They told them what Jesus had said; and they allowed them to take it. ⁷Then they brought the colt to Jesus and threw their cloaks on it; and he sat on it. ⁸Many people spread their cloaks on the road, and others spread leafy branches that they had cut in the fields. ⁹Then those who went ahead and those who followed were shouting, 'Hosanna! ¹⁰Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Blessed is the coming kingdom of our ancestor David! Hosanna in the highest heaven!' ¹¹Then he entered Jerusalem and went into the temple; and when he had looked around at everything, as it was already late, he went out to Bethany with the twelve.

PRAISE TO YOU LORD JESUS CHRIST

Reflection

Palm/Passion

This week's readings are ones of celebration and protest. In Mark 11:1–11, people who process with Jesus into Jerusalem do so as also a form of a counter-protest. In John 12:12–16, the actions of those who come to meet Jesus as he enters the city challenge political power. Psalm 118:1–2, 19–29 is one way to remember the people's protest against slavery in Egypt, and to celebrate God's saving actions.

Mark 11:1–11 At the start of Passover, Jesus rides into the city of Jerusalem on a borrowed donkey. Large crowds gather around and follow him. People spread cloaks on the road; others spread leafy branches cut from the fields. While this was a seemingly simple procession, it was likely a more complex challenge to political power.

The book *The Last Week*, written by New Testament scholars Marcus J. Borg and John Dominic Crossan, offers an account of what the gospels say about Jesus' last days in Jerusalem.

The authors note that at the same time Jesus was entering the city of Jerusalem by one gate, Pilate was entering from another gate in another part of the city. Pilate's procession was a striking display of state and military power. He entered with warhorses and Roman soldiers. It is Passover, a festival when the people remember their time of enslavement in Egypt and celebrate their freedom from tyranny. Part of their history of remembrance includes their ancestors challenging and fleeing from Egypt's Pharaoh. For Pilate, his stately display in Passover may have also served to remind people of the day to maintain order, and that they should not resist their current ruling authority. Even as they remember protesting in the past, they should not do that in the present. In some ways, Pilate's processional was a manifestation of empire.

Jesus' processional, by contrast, was a simple one where he rode a donkey. "According to the prophet Zechariah, the king entering Jerusalem on a donkey was to banish weapons of war from the land and speak peace to the nations" (Marcus J Borg, "Holy Week: Two Different Meanings"). The people shouted "Hosanna," which means "save us." The crowds with Jesus were not people who traditionally held power in society. They were part of a peripheral religious group that was led by an unusual leader. One way of describing this processional is as a counter-protest that resisted the status quo.

In John 12:12–16, the alternative gospel reading for this week, there is also a challenge to the status quo, and a hope for change. People who follow are part of an outlier religious group. When Jesus came into Jerusalem, he was not only entering a centre of power but also a place of potential danger. Some note that his deliberate entry may have been a defiant act against Roman rule. In this story of the entry into Jerusalem, the people come with palm branches. Palm branches were a national symbol at the time and used in "official" processionals of powerful and influential people. Some suggest that people on the margins using palm branches may have been a way of challenging such authority.

Psalm 118:1–2, 19–29 is a processional psalm sung by pilgrims coming to worship on high holy days. It is a thanksgiving for God's liberating and saving work, God's steadfast and enduring love. This psalm was one of the Egyptian Hallels – an Egyptian hymn of praise. Egyptian Hallels are still used during Passover today.

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Palm Sunday is a day to both celebrate with Jesus and to remember the counter-protests and challenges to authority. What does it mean to celebrate Jesus? How do we tell the stories of the protests in Jesus' day and the present day?

Connecting scripture and life

The crowds that create a parade of honour for Jesus as he enters Jerusalem call out for salvation. In their understanding of how the world worked, this had to come from a king. But Jesus is not royal in this sense. His salvation comes without glitz and glamour, without decrees and the need for subservience. Although they are looking to the right person, the crowd is looking for the wrong thing.

- What impact does this lack of insight have in the days that follow?
- When are we like the crowd, looking for salvation in places that are not going to bring about any kind of deliverance?


