

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This Week's Readings

First reading from the Prophet Nehemiah 8.1-3, 5-6, 8-10

¹all the people gathered together into the square before the Water Gate. They told the scribe Ezra to bring the book of the law of Moses, which the Lord had given to Israel. ²Accordingly, the priest Ezra brought the law before the assembly, both men and women and all who could hear with understanding. This was on the first day of the seventh month. ³He read from it facing the square before the Water Gate from early morning until midday, in the presence of the men and the women and those who could understand; and the ears of all the people were attentive to the book of the law. ⁵And Ezra opened the book in the sight of all the people, for he was standing above all the people; and when he opened it, all the people stood up. ⁶Then Ezra blessed the Lord, the great God, and all the people answered, 'Amen, Amen', lifting up their hands. Then they bowed their heads and worshipped the Lord with their faces to the ground. 8So they read from the book, from the law of God, with interpretation. They gave the sense, so that the people understood the reading. ⁹And Nehemiah, who was the governor, and Ezra the priest and scribe, and the Levites who taught the people said to all the people, 'This day is holy to the Lord your God; do not mourn or weep.' For all the people wept when they heard the words of the law. 10 Then he said to them, 'Go your way, eat the fat and drink sweet wine and send portions of them to those for whom nothing is prepared, for this day is holy to our Lord; and do not be grieved, for the joy of the Lord is your strength.'

A reading from 1 Corinthians 12.12-31

¹²For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. ¹³For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and we were all made to drink of one Spirit. ¹⁴Indeed, the body does not consist of one member but of many. ¹⁵If the foot were to say, 'Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body', that would not make it any less a part of the body. ¹⁶And if the ear were to say, 'Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body', that would not make it any less a part of the body. ¹⁷ If the whole body were an eye, where would the hearing be? If the whole body were hearing, where would the sense of smell be? ¹⁸But as it is, God arranged the members in the body, each one of them, as he chose. ¹⁹If all were a single member, where would the body be? ²⁰As it is, there are many members, yet one body. ²¹The eye cannot say to the hand, 'I have no need of you', nor again the head to the feet, 'I have no need of you.' ²²On the contrary, the members of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, ²³ and those members of the body that we think less honourable we clothe with greater honour, and our less respectable members are treated with greater respect; ²⁴whereas our more respectable members do not need this. But God has so arranged the body, giving the greater honour to the inferior member, ²⁵that there may be no dissension within the body, but the members may have the same care for one another. ²⁶If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honoured, all rejoice together with it. ²⁷Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it. ²⁸And God has appointed in the church first apostles, second prophets, third teachers; then deeds of power, then gifts of healing, forms of assistance, forms of leadership, various kinds of tongues. ²⁹Are all apostles? Are all prophets? Are all teachers? Do all work miracles? ³⁰Do all possess gifts of healing? Do all speak in tongues? Do all interpret? ³¹But strive for the greater gifts. And I will show you a still more excellent way.

The Holy Gospel

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke 4.14-21 GLORY TO YOU, LORD JESUS CHRIST

¹⁴Then Jesus, filled with the power of the Spirit, returned to Galilee, and a report about him spread through all the surrounding country. ¹⁵He began to teach in their synagogues and was praised by everyone. ¹⁶When he came to Nazareth, where he had been brought up, he went to the synagogue on the sabbath day, as was his custom. He stood up to read, ¹⁷and the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was given to him. He unrolled the scroll and found the place where it was written: ¹⁸'The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, ¹⁹to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour.' ²⁰And he rolled up the scroll, gave it back to the attendant, and sat down. The eyes of all in the synagogue were fixed on him. ²¹Then he began to say to them, 'Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing.' (*Pause for reflection*)

PRAISE TO YOU LORD JESUS CHRIST.

REFLECTION

Spirited Voice

With the Spirit upon him, Jesus teaches about God's good ways and good news to those whose lives have not experienced good. Such ways and news cry out to be heard and done today. The past may instruct; the future may beckon; today is when these ways and this news need to be lived and fulfilled. This is the day the Spirit empowers us with boldness and trust.

Nehemiah 8:1–3, 5–6, 8–10 relates how the exiles who returned to Jerusalem hear the word not only read, but also interpreted so that it can be understood. Such teaching relies on the attentive hearing of the people. Psalm 19 This psalm depicts the telling of God's glory through the many voices and images of creation. The speaking of those witnesses leads to a series of metaphors for the law that forms the basis for life. 1 Corinthians 12:12–31a Paul reminds this very diverse church of their need for one another. They are formed into God's people just as the human body is formed, with all its separate parts cooperating together in common function and purpose.

Luke 4:14–21 Earlier stories in Luke relate how Mary and Joseph observed Jewish customs (2:21–24, 41). Now the gospel affirms that Jesus honours those traditions. Jesus observes the Sabbath by going to the synagogue in his hometown of Nazareth. He stands to read scripture and sits to teach, as was the custom of rabbis.

What did Jesus teach about God's way to those in the Nazareth synagogue?

This passage is only the first half of Jesus' teaching there – the rest comes in next week's focus passage. Jesus begins his teaching by reading a passage from the prophet Isaiah. We do not know if this choice was his or was a designated reading for that Sabbath. It is unclear whether there was a set cycle of readings from the prophets in this era. If it was the designated text, at the very least Jesus invites wonder about what he means by saying these words are fulfilled "in your hearing." But if Jesus chose this passage, there are other implications to consider.

The "year of God's favour" at the end of these words from Isaiah refers to Israel's tradition of Jubilee. Leviticus 25 describes the elements of Jubilee. It was to be observed every fifty years. Jubilee called for the return of all lands to their original owners.

It provided for the freedom of indentured servants. There is no evidence that Israel ever fully kept a year of Jubilee, yet it remained a promise and hope.

Anointed by the Spirit, Jesus brings the good news of God – release, recovery, setting free. The scriptures for today affirm that God will help us understand and practice God's good ways. How might Isaiah's words shape our understanding and practice of mission? In what ways do our words and lives proclaim the good news of God's ways?

Connecting scripture and life

- How do we interpret who we are as God's people in a changing world?
- In what ways can we help one another tell our story and remember God's good news?
- What actions can we take to bring God's good news release, recovery, setting free – to our communities?
