ABM Reflection

Today's gospel reading continues the story of the beginning of Jesus ministry in Galilee. Last week the hearers of the passage from Isaiah that Jesus read were delighted. This week, however, not so much. In fact, they wanted to throw him off a cliff. Jesus had quoted stories from Scripture that offended them. He reminded them that in a time of famine God had chosen not someone Jewish, but the widow at Zarephath in Sidon (modern-day Lebanon) to be blessed by a visit from the prophet Elijah. She was blessed by never running out of oil and flour. And, to add insult to injury, he mentioned Naaman, the commander of the Syrian army, whom God had healed of his leprosy in the time of Elijah's successor, Elisha. Gentiles being recipients of God's grace was not an idea that pleased those around Jesus that day in the synagogue.

- Give thanks for the work and witness of the Church of North India, remembering especially today their ministry in a predominantly non-Christian context

Now the word of the Lord came to me saying, 'Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, and before you were born I consecrated you; I appointed you a prophet to the nations.' Then I said, 'Ah, Lord God! Truly I do not know how to speak, for I am only a boy.' But the Lord said to me, 'Do not say, "I am only a boy"; for you shall go to all to whom I send you, and you shall speak whatever I command you. Do not be afraid of them, for I am with you to deliver you, says the Lord.' Then the Lord put out his hand and touched my mouth; and the Lord said to me, 'Now I have put my words in your mouth. See, today I appoint you over nations and over kingdoms, to pluck up and to pull down, to destroy and to overthrow, to build and to plant.'

A reading from 1 Corinthians 13.1-13

¹If I speak in the tongues of mortals and of angels, but do not have love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal. ²And if I have prophetic powers, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing. ³ If I give away all my possessions, and if I hand over my body so that I may boast, but do not have love, I gain nothing. ⁴Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant ⁵or rude. ⁶It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. ⁷It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. ⁸Love never ends. But as for prophecies, they will come to an end; as for tongues, they will cease; as for knowledge, it will come to an end. ⁹For we know only in part, and we prophesy only in part; ¹⁰but when the complete comes, the partial will come to an end.

¹¹When I was a child, I spoke like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child; when I became an adult, I put an end to childish ways. ¹²For now we see in a mirror, dimly, but then we will see face to face. The Holy Gospel

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke 4.21-30

GLORY TO YOU, LORD JESUS CHRIST

²¹Then he began to say to them, 'Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing.' ²²All spoke well of him and were amazed at the gracious words that came from his mouth. They said, 'Is not this Joseph's son?' ²³He said to them, 'Doubtless you will quote to me this proverb, "Doctor, cure yourself!" And you will say, "Do here also in your home town the things that we have heard you did at Capernaum." ' ²⁴And he said, 'Truly I tell you, no prophet is accepted in the prophet's home town. ²⁵But the truth is, there were many widows in Israel in the time of Elijah, when the heaven was shut up for three years and six months, and there was a severe famine over all the land; ²⁶yet Elijah was sent to none of them except to a widow at Zarephath in Sidon. ²⁷There were also many lepers in Israel in the time of the prophet Elisha, and none of them was cleansed except Naaman the Syrian.' ²⁸When they heard this, all in the synagogue were filled with rage. ²⁹They got up, drove him out of the town, and led him to the brow of the hill on which their town was built, so that they might hurl him off the cliff. ³⁰But he passed through the midst of them and (Pause for reflection) went on his way.

REFLECTION

Speaking Out

Prophetic voices borne of love call us to trust and practice God's ways, even when those ways conflict with our own. Such voices may be difficult to hear or raise when the setting is what and who we have known as home. Speaking out takes courage. God gives us the words to speak. The edge of prophetic word and action comes in the challenge of discerning what will best serve God's way of love for all.

Jeremiah 1:4–10 In Jerusalem at the time of Jeremiah's call, religious practice had become completely corrupt. The whole nation was in need of repentance. The divine imperative described in 1:10 was no easy task, but though he was young, Jeremiah seemed to sense the scope of this responsibility.

Psalm 71:1–6 sounds the same promise that Jeremiah heard: we are known by God, who is always faithful to us. The psalmist's plea for protection recognizes God has been faithful in the past and God will offer the help and comfort we need in the future.

1 Corinthians 13:1–13 Just as Jeremiah is called and commissioned, so too the Corinthian church and the church today are also called and commissioned. In this passage, this call is defined: love. Paul writes that despite their great differences, God can be known in the love that members of this church share with one another.

Luke 4:21–30 Jesus refers, in verse 23, to an earlier ministry in Capernaum. Some scholars suggest there may have been friction between Nazareth, a small farming village, and Capernaum, a more populous fishing centre. Matthew 4:12 notes: "Jesus left Nazareth and made his home in Capernaum." This adopted home might not have sat well with the folks in Nazareth. Also, Capernaum may have been home to a Roman garrison and a number of Gentiles. Perhaps some wondered: "Why would 'our' Jesus live among enemies and outcasts?"

Jesus follows his word about a prophet not being honoured at home with stories of the Hebrew prophets Elijah and Elisha. Jesus clearly identifies himself with the prophetic tradition by doing so. Both stories recall acts of ministry outside of Israel. The appeal to Elijah is especially apt to this episode in Nazareth. Elijah stirred up trouble by his works as a prophet of God, and became the enemy of King Ahab and Queen Jezebel. They decided to kill the prophet (1 Kings 18–19). Their plans do not succeed, just as the plans of the crowd in Nazareth do not.

Jesus twice refers to "hometown." The Greek word is *patris*, literally "land of the fathers." This implies more than a local community; it speaks of nation and people. For this gospel writer, this story of the response to Jesus is more than an isolated incident in Nazareth. Luke's gospel is headed toward places and persons that go beyond the normal understandings of patris. The stories of Elijah and Elisha were part of the tradition of Judaism. Jesus speaks as a Jew when he uses them in his "sermon." But sometimes people become used to overlooking parts of their tradition they find uncomfortable. As Dr. Fred Craddock observed about this story, "learning what we already know is often painfully difficult."

The gospel writer leaves two questions unanswered here. First, what accounts for the change in attitude between verse 22 and verses 28–29? Some suggest the ending of verse 22 could be heard as a critique by a person who does not know her or his place. Second, what allows for Jesus' escape? Does the crowd realize what it would mean to kill one of their own children? Is the gospel writer implying God's intervention?

One thing is clear for the gospel of Luke: the mission Jesus announced will continue to unfold on the edge. •••••

What God wants for our lives and all creation does not always coincide with our wants. Faith is not always an easy way to live, and always must be a way engaged with love. God calls us to speak out, proclaiming God's love and justice for those on the margins. What have been some hard things for you to learn about God or following Jesus? What has made it possible for you to hear or follow them?

Connecting scripture and life

- Knowing that God knows you, what do you think God is calling you to do and say that will build up or tear down, in order that God's love will be known by all?
- How does your faith community encourage any and all to speak out?
