This Week's Readings

First reading from First reading from Deuteronomy 26.1-11

¹When you have come into the land that the Lord your God is giving you as an inheritance to possess, and you possess it, and settle in it, ²you shall take some of the first of all the fruit of the ground, which you harvest from the land that the Lord your God is giving you, and you shall put it in a basket and go to the place that the Lord vour God will choose as a dwelling for his name. ³You shall go to the priest who is in office at that time, and say to him, 'Today I declare to the Lord your God that I have come into the land that the Lord swore to our ancestors to give us.' ⁴When the priest takes the basket from your hand and sets it down before the altar of the Lord your God, ⁵you shall make this response before the Lord your God: 'A wandering Aramean was my ancestor; he went down into Egypt and lived there as an alien, few in number, and there he became a great nation, mighty and populous. ⁶When the Egyptians treated us harshly and afflicted us, by imposing hard labour on us, ⁷we cried to the Lord, the God of our ancestors; the Lord heard our voice and saw our affliction, our toil, and our oppression. ⁸The Lord brought us out of Egypt with a mighty hand and an outstretched arm, with a terrifying display of power, and with signs and wonders; ⁹and he brought us into this place and gave us this land, a land flowing with milk and honey. ¹⁰So now I bring the first of the fruit of the ground that you, O Lord , have given me.' You shall set it down before the Lord your God and bow down before the Lord your God. ¹¹Then you, together with the Levites and the aliens who reside among you, shall celebrate with all the bounty that the Lord your God has given to you and to your house. (Pause for reflection) Hear the Word of the Lord.

Psalm 91.1-2. 91.9-16

¹ Those who dwell in the shelter of the Most High: who abide under the shadow of the Almighty,

² They will say to the Lord 'You are my refuge and my stronghold: my God in whom I trust.'

⁹ The Lord himself is your refuge: you have made the Most High your stronghold.

¹⁰ Therefore no harm will befall you:

nor will any scourge come near your tent.

¹¹ For he will command his angels:

to keep you in all your ways.

¹² They will bear you up in their hands:

lest you dash your foot against a stone.

¹³ You will tread on the lion and the adder:

the young lion and the serpent you will trample under foot.

¹⁴ 'You have set your love upon me,' says the Lord, 'and therefore I will deliver you: I will lift you out of danger, because you have known my name.

¹⁵ 'When you call upon me I will answer you:

I will be with you in trouble, I will rescue you and bring you to honour.

A reading from Romans 10.4-13

⁴For Christ is the end of the law so that there may be righteousness for everyone who believes. ⁵Moses writes concerning the righteousness that comes from the law, that 'the person who does these things will live by them.' ⁶But the righteousness that comes from faith says, 'Do not say in your heart, "Who will ascend into heaven?" ' (that is, to bring Christ down) ⁷ or "Who will descend into the abyss?" ' (that is, to bring Christ down) ⁸But what does it say? 'The word is near you, on your lips and in your heart' (that is, the word of faith that we proclaim); ⁹because if you confess with your lips that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. ¹⁰For one believes with the heart and so is justified, and one confesses with the mouth and so is saved. ¹¹The scripture says, 'No one who believes in him will be put to shame.' ¹²For there is no distinction between Jew and Greek; the same Lord is Lord of all and is generous to all who call on him. ¹³For, 'Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved.'

The Holy Gospel

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke 4.1-15

GLORY TO YOU, LORD JESUS CHRIST

¹Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, returned from the Jordan and was led by the Spirit in the wilderness, ²where for forty days he was tempted by the devil. He ate nothing at all during those days, and when they were over, he was famished. ³The devil said to him, 'If you are the Son of God, command this stone to become a loaf of bread.' ⁴Jesus answered him, 'It is written, "One does not live by bread alone." ' ⁵Then the devil led him up and showed him in an instant all the kingdoms of the world. ⁶And the devil said to him, 'To you I will give their glory and all this authority; for it has been given over to me, and I give it to anyone I please. ⁷If you, then, will worship me, it will all be yours.' ⁸Jesus answered him, 'It is written, "Worship the Lord your God, and serve only him." ' ⁹Then the devil took him to Jerusalem, and placed him on the pinnacle of the temple, saying to him, 'If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down from here, ¹⁰for it is written, "He will command his angels concerning you, to protect you", ¹¹and "On their hands they will bear you up, so that you will not dash your foot against a stone." ' ¹²Jesus answered him, 'It is said, "Do not put the Lord your God to the test." ' ¹³When the devil had finished every test, he departed from him until an opportune time.

¹⁴Then Jesus, filled with the power of the Spirit, returned to Galilee, and a report about him spread through all the surrounding country. ¹⁵He began to teach in their synagogues and was praised by everyone.

REFLECTION

Practice Gratitude

Moving into the Season of Lent offers a different landscape after the growing confidence of Epiphany. The colours and mood change with the destination becoming more focused in our minds. The dust of the earth seems a little foreign, indeed even alien, for this is land through which we do not always choose to travel. May the dust remind us of our role in the decay of the world and serve as a sign of hope in the God who sees potential even in ashes and dust.

Deuteronomy 26:1–11 There are two ways to read this passage. One is to use it for power and possession, claiming a faith story that stamps our ownership on the land we want because "God has given it to us." The alternative is to let the text remind us that all land we travel across is God's.

God dwells in the land and the people of Israel who enter it are reminded of this; the land is God's and God dwells here. Yet this story has become part of a religious meta-narrative (a narrative about a narrative) to prove particular land has been given to particular people. This claim is part of what underlies the Palestine/Israel conflict and conflicts in many other places where invading cultures have tried to claim that their God has given them the land, which the original inhabitants believed belongs to all. The text, however, does not necessarily allow that claim.

The description of an offering from the land may have been a one-off event, or an annual ritual. "First fruits" giving reflects an ancient understanding that the land and its produce belong to God. Those who live in the land have a responsibility to share that gift with others, and to preserve it for future generations. God's gifts are universal. If this was an annual offering, then the lesson is for each generation to remind itself of the gifts God has given, not for possession but as a place to live, a place that offers life, a place that shapes the reign of God as a just sharing of the gifts of God. The wilderness journey of Lent calls us to the one place where all belong, the Commonwealth of God.

Psalm 91:1–2, 9–16 asserts that we find our true dwelling place in God who is our refuge and strength. But before we assert that this is just another piece of selfish theology, we can read this psalm against other passages that invite us to break out of a "just for us" or "chosen few" theology and bring it into a more universal context.

This is the very point **Romans 10:8b–13** makes when it claims there is no distinction between Jew and Greek (10:12). Yet even here are some who write theology but put exclusive clauses into Christian doctrine.

When we meet Jesus in the wilderness in **Luke 4:1–13** we find ourselves once more in no one's land, and learn from Jesus' experience whom to trust. In such wilderness places we can choose whom to serve. It is our choice this Lenten time. Choose wisely.

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Lent is about a choice, either to put down roots, or to journey. This is not just a practical question but a theological one – to push our doctrinal roots into a land and claim who is in and who is out; or to let ourselves wander through the land knowing the only one who ultimately owns anything is God, who created all and who calls us to journey and travel as foreigners in a new land, trusting the one who guides us and calls us through. What practices or rituals of gratitude can you embrace in response to all God gives and provides?

Connecting scripture and life

Lent brings us into an alien land.

- What might you do or use to guide yourself through Lent?
- What landmarks might you use on this journey? What signs and symbols give you hope?
- What might you celebrate and what offerings might you give in this season of travelling?


