



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This Week's Readings

First reading from Acts 9.36-43

³⁶ Now in Joppa there was a disciple whose name was Tabitha, which in Greek is Dorcas. She was devoted to good works and acts of charity. ³⁷ At that time she became ill and died. When they had washed her, they laid her in a room upstairs. ³⁸ Since Lydda was near Joppa, the disciples, who heard that Peter was there, sent two men to him with the request, 'Please come to us without delay.' ³⁹ So Peter got up and went with them; and when he arrived, they took him to the room upstairs. All the widows stood beside him, weeping and showing tunics and other clothing that Dorcas had made while she was with them. ⁴⁰ Peter put all of them outside, and then he knelt down and prayed. He turned to the body and said, 'Tabitha, get up.' Then she opened her eyes, and seeing Peter, she sat up. ⁴¹ He gave her his hand and helped her up. Then calling the saints and widows, he showed her to be alive. ⁴² This became known throughout Joppa, and many believed in the Lord. ⁴³ Meanwhile he stayed in Joppa for some time with a certain Simon, a tanner.

A reading from Revelation 7.9-17

⁹ After this I looked, and there was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, from all tribes and peoples and languages, standing before the throne and before the Lamb, robed in white, with palm branches in their hands. ¹⁰ They cried out in a loud voice, saying, 'Salvation belongs to our God who is seated on the throne, and to the Lamb!' ¹¹ And all the angels stood around the throne and around the elders and the four living creatures, and they fell on their faces before the throne and worshipped God, ¹² singing, 'Amen! Blessing and glory and wisdom and thanksgiving and honour and power and might be to our God for ever and ever

! Amen.' ¹³ Then one of the elders addressed me, saying, 'Who are these, robed in white, and where have they come from?' ¹⁴ I said to him, 'Sir, you are the one that knows.' Then he said to me, 'These are they who have come out of the great ordeal; they have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb. ¹⁵ For this reason they are before the throne of God, and worship him day and night within his temple, and the one who is seated on the throne will shelter them.¹⁶ They will hunger no more, and thirst no more; the sun will not strike them, nor any scorching heat: ¹⁷ for the Lamb at the centre of the throne will be their shepherd, and he will guide them to springs of the water of life, and God will wipe away every tear from their eyes.'

²² At that time the festival of the Dedication took place in Jerusalem. It was winter, ²³ and Jesus was walking in the temple, in the portico of Solomon.²⁴ So the Jews gathered around him and said to him, 'How long will you keep us in suspense? If you are the Messiah, tell us plainly.' ²⁵ Jesus answered, 'I have told you, and you do not believe. The works that I do in my Father's name testify to me; ²⁶ but you do not believe, because you do not belong to my sheep. ²⁷ My sheep hear my voice. I know them, and they follow me.²⁸ I give them eternal life, and they will never perish. No one will snatch them out of my hand.²⁹ What my Father has given me is greater than all else, and no one can snatch it out of the Father's hand. 30 The Father and I are (Pause for reflection) one.'

REFLECTION

Life-giving Acts

Life-giving acts expressed in compassionate words and deeds take shape in ministry with those in our communities and outside our circles. Life-giving acts wipe away tears, restore life, and testify to God's love. As we open our lives to the Spirit and follow God's leading, we can offer such witness.

Acts 9:36-43 Peter is called to Joppa, some ten miles away, because Tabitha (Dorcas in Greek) has died. Giving both forms of the name is a reminder that this is a mixed Jewish- Gentile community and a pointer to the direction in which the church's mission is moving. The story follows right after the healing of Aeneas in Lydda. Peter calls both by name and instructs them to rise or get up.

Aeneas rises from his bed and Tabitha from death. Both occasions reveal Peter's actions in continuity with the actions of Jesus, and reveal Peter to be an agent of resurrection.

We learn little about Aeneas but glean more detail about the life of Tabitha. She is a highly respected disciple, one who puts her faith into action by caring for the weak and the widowed in her town. The women show Peter the clothes Tabitha made for those who relied upon her generosity. From the brief description of her home and the lack of mention of others in the household, she appears to be a single woman of means. The upper room of her home, where she is laid out to rest, may well have been a place of prayer and fellowship where Tabitha played the role of host. That she was significant not only to the widows but to the whole congregation is seen in two of the men being dispatched to find Peter, and in the house filled with the company of the saints, men and women together.

This is the personal story of a much-loved and much-needed woman experiencing first-hand the resurrection power of Jesus. The story is also a reminder that the focus of community life, worship, prayer, the working of miracles, and new life experience was celebrated in upper rooms like that of Tabitha. The upper rooms were becoming places to wash feet, eat together, pray together, and do good for those in need. The locus of the spirit was on the move into people's lives and homes, and in the call to get up and live, as heard in such personal stories.

Psalm 23 reminds us that, wherever we are, there is a power that is restorative and life-giving.

Revelation 7:9–17 offers a vision of a life beyond all our troubles, a life beyond death itself. All colours are contained in white, and all peoples of Earth are here robed together in white before the throne of God, where no further harm will touch them. So, in **John 10:22–30**, Jesus promises that his sheep will be with him and can never be snatched away. No matter what occurs, we can look to Christ and identify him then and now in acts of loving-kindness, in actions that show the presence and the power of God with us.

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The Easter season is a call to get up and live in the power of the risen Christ, which can empower us to overcome those things that have harmed and hindered us, and to take the lead in loving service in the communities in which we live. What might we, individually and as the church, learn from Tabitha and Peter about life-giving service? **Connecting scripture and life**

- What kind of leadership does church and community require?
- What might we, individually and as a church, learn from Tabitha and Peter about serving that is life-giving?

Some traditions observe this day as Good Shepherd Sunday.


