

First reading from Acts 9.1-6

¹Meanwhile Saul, still breathing threats and murder against the disciples of the Lord, went to the high priest ²and asked him for letters to the synagogues at Damascus, so that if he found any who belonged to the Way, men or women, he might bring them bound to Jerusalem. ³Now as he was going along and approaching Damascus, suddenly a light from heaven flashed around him. ⁴He fell to the ground and heard a voice saying to him, 'Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?' ⁵He asked, 'Who are you, Lord?' The reply came, 'I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting. ⁶But get up and enter the city, and you will be told what you are to do.'

¹² That my heart may sing your praise and never be silent:

O Lord my God, I will give you thanks for ever.

A reading from Revelation 5.6-14

⁶Then I saw between the throne and the four living creatures and among the elders a Lamb standing as if it had been slaughtered, having seven horns and seven eyes,

which are the seven spirits of God sent out into all the earth. ⁷He went and took the scroll from the right hand of the one who was seated on the throne. ⁸When he had taken the scroll, the four living creatures and the twenty-four elders fell before the Lamb, each holding a harp and golden bowls full of incense, which are the prayers of the saints. ⁹They sing a new song: 'You are worthy to take the scroll and to open its seals, for you were slaughtered and by your blood you ransomed for God saints from every tribe and language and people and nation; 10 you have made them to be a kingdom and priests serving our God, and they will reign on earth.' 11Then I looked, and I heard the voice of many angels surrounding the throne and the living creatures and the elders; they numbered myriads of myriads and thousands of thousands, ¹²singing with full voice, 'Worthy is the Lamb that was slaughtered to receive power and wealth and wisdom and might and honour and glory and blessing! 13Then I heard every creature in heaven and on earth and under the earth and in the sea, and all that is in them, singing, 'To the one seated on the throne and to the Lamb be blessing and honour and glory and might for ever and ever!' ¹⁴And the four living creatures said, 'Amen!' And the elders fell down and worshipped.

The Holy Gospel

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according John 21.1.-19

GLORY TO YOU, LORD JESUS CHRIST

¹After these things Jesus showed himself again to the disciples by the Sea of Tiberias; and he showed himself in this way. ²Gathered there together were Simon Peter, Thomas called the Twin, Nathanael of Cana in Galilee, the sons of Zebedee, and two others of his disciples. ³Simon Peter said to them, 'I am going fishing.' They said to him, 'We will go with you.' They went out and got into the boat, but that night they caught nothing. ⁴Just after daybreak, Jesus stood on the beach; but the disciples did not know that it was Jesus. ⁵Jesus said to them, 'Children, you have no fish, have you?' They answered him, 'No.' ⁶He said to them, 'Cast the net to the right side of the boat, and you will find some.' So they cast it, and now they were not able to haul it in because there were so many fish. ⁷That disciple whom Jesus loved said to Peter, 'It is the Lord!' When Simon Peter heard that it was the Lord, he put on some clothes, for he was naked, and jumped into the lake. ⁸But the other disciples came in the boat, dragging the net full of fish, for they were not far from the land, only about a hundred vards off. ⁹When they had gone ashore, they saw a charcoal fire there, with fish on it, and bread. ¹⁰Jesus said to them, 'Bring some of the fish that you have just caught.' ¹¹So Simon Peter went aboard and hauled the net ashore, full of large fish, a hundred and fifty-three of them; and though there were so many, the net was not torn. 12 Jesus said to them, 'Come and have breakfast.' Now none of the disciples dared to ask him, 'Who are you?' because they knew it was the Lord. 13 Jesus came and took the bread and gave it to them, and did the same with the fish.

¹⁴This was now the third time that Jesus appeared to the disciples after he was raised from the dead. ¹⁵When they had finished breakfast, Jesus said to Simon Peter, 'Simon son of John, do you love me more than these?' He said to him, 'Yes, Lord; you know that I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Feed my lambs.' ¹⁶A second time he said to him, 'Simon son of John, do you love me?' He said to him, 'Yes, Lord; you know that I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Tend my sheep.' ¹⁷He said to him the third time, 'Simon son of John, do you love me?' Peter felt hurt because he said to him the third time, 'Do you love me?' And he said to him, 'Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Feed my sheep. ¹⁸Very truly, I tell you, when you were younger, you used to fasten your own belt and to go wherever you wished. But when you grow old, you will stretch out your hands, and someone else will fasten a belt around you and take you where you do not wish to go.' ¹⁹(He said this to indicate the kind of death by which he would glorify God.) After this he said to him, 'Follow me.'

PRAISE TO YOU LORD JESUS CHRIST

REFLECTION

Going Global

There is something very daring and controversial in living the gospel of restoration and reconciliation. If we are made whole by the grace and love of God, then our invitation is to live that relationship in community. Imagine what it was like for those persecuted at Paul's hand to listen to him now preach the gospel of love and grace to them.

Acts 9:1–20 How would Ananias feel when faced with the call to look for Paul, who had persecuted the early church so violently? This week's reading from the book of Acts speaks of the change in one person because of the whole believing community: Ananias in his trust, and the rest of the community in accepting and including the one who once persecuted them. While this story is often told as the "conversion" of Paul, it also helps to talk of redemption, because conversion is usually about the individual but redemption is a broader concept; it changes all those involved. To reach out and include someone who once persecuted you is the hard edge of real gospel living.

It is natural to question what Ananias felt when called to bring healing to Paul, and to wonder what the community felt as they listened to the one who hurt them so violently. Hidden in the story is perhaps a resurrection image for the whole church; that of the three days' wait between Paul being blinded and seeing again. There is a time of waiting for resurrection.

But transformation comes, as **Psalm 30** extols. The writer celebrates God, who transforms mourning into dancing and weeping into joy. At the heart of faith is the promise that pain and violence will be transformed. This is a powerful image of what God's grace and love can do. It energizes a transformation rather than simply making everything better.

In **Revelation 5:11–14**, the community worships. It is an amazing image of a love that restores. The constant references throughout the book of the "slaughtered lamb" suggest that God can place more power in such a thing than in all the might of Rome, which was at the time rallied against the church. There is an irony in this image, for the lamb was slaughtered but now is risen.

The world may neither know nor acknowledge that, but the church does, and therein finds strength.

John 21:1–19 continues the story of restoration. Peter, who had three times denied knowing Jesus, is now asked three times if he loves him.

He is frustrated with being pushed on the issue, yet the symbol can be a strong one. Maybe Jesus asks us repeatedly to show our love and, in turn, to do what Jesus commands: feed the world with grace.

The story popularly known as "Paul's conversion" may be more about the daring and controversial work of redemption or restoration, where the community offers the one who hurt that same community justice and grace. It is another example of the resurrection at work in the faith community.

Our call is to live the hard edge of the gospel that accepts in grace and offers justice to those who have been unjust towards that same community. What trust is required for you to risk transformation, especially in places of brokenness, so God's Spirit may bring restoration, renewal, transformation? What stories do you know that began personally, spread locally, and became global?

Connecting scripture and life

God calls, restores, and commissions individuals and communities to serve as witnesses to the transforming and enduring ways of love – to live the "hard edge" of the gospel.

 Where, today, is the church called to have courage and be part of God's mission of reconciliation and peace?
